# MASTER OF ARTS

Eligibility for admission in First Year of M.A.(English Literature) is minimum 48% marks in Graduation. A weight age of 5% in Post Graduate Course shall be given to a student from B. A.(Hons.) English. As regards admission on reserved category seats government rules will be applicable.

# SCHEME OF EXAMINATION

The number of the paper and the maximum marks for each paper together, with the minimum marks required to pass are shown against each subject separately. It will be necessary for a candidate to pass in the theory as well as the practical part of a subject/paper, wherever prescribed, separately.

Classification of successful candidates shall be as follows:

First Division of the aggregate marks prescribed in Semesters 60% I to IV taken together 50%

Second Division

All the rest shall be declared to have passed the examination.

- ▲ For passing a candidate shall have to secure at least 40% marks in each course (Theory and Practical separately).
- ▲ No division shall be awarded in Semesters I to III.
- ▲ Whenever a candidate appears for a due paper examination, she will do so according to the syllabus in
- A candidate not appearing in any examination/absent in any paper of term end Semester shall be considered as having DUE in those papers.
- ▲ The candidates are required to opt anyone paper from 305(A)/305(B) in semester III and from papers 405(A)/405(B) in semester IV.
- ▲ For DSE papers ENGM 305(B) and ENGM 405(B) will be taught, provided, there should be 50%+1 student opting for it.
