### **IV** The Practice

- I. In pursuit of excellence Seminars, Workshops, Panel Discussions were conducted throughout the year at 3 different levels to cater to the parents, students and faculty.
  - a. A seminar on Autonomy, followed by a panel discussion on the same topic "Is Autonomy good or bad" was organized by IQAC to help parents understand the pros and cons of Autonomy.
  - b. A UGC sponsored National Seminar on "Sensitization towards Values through Literature" was organized by the Department of English to reinforce the importance of Values in our Society and to discuss how to transmit these Values through Literature.
  - c. A UGC sponsored National Workshop on "Empowerment of Women in the Present Scenario" was organized by the Department of Home Science to help the students feel empowered and also inspire them for future possibilities of empowerment through real life stories of the alumni of the college.
  - d. A Seminar was conducted by experts on how to safely use LPG in our kitchens.
  - e. Mr. Anshuman Kelsy from the Taj Group of Hotels conducted a seminar for the students regarding career opportunities in the hospitality industry.
  - f. The Collector of Ajmer conducted a Seminar to spread awareness for General Elections and to emphasize the importance and power of the vote under the campaign SWEEP.
  - g. The faculty was apprised on the opportunities of Research and Post Doctoral Research that are offered by Full Bright Scholarships.
  - h. Mrs. Anahita Lee conducted a workshop on 'Group Discussion and Mind Tools' to open up our eyes to the various dynamics of group behaviour and how to use different mind tools like the Thinking Caps and Pop Beans.
  - i. Dr. Sr. Melba, a well know gynaecologist of the city, conducted a Seminar on 'Family Life Education' for faculty, as well as students.
  - j. Mr. Anil Kumar conducted a Seminar on 'Financial Literacy' sponsored by SEBI.
  - k. Peer Training by senior students to train junior students to continue the legacy of the college continues all through the year.
  - II. The college tried to keep up with the technological innovations by introducing the following:

- a. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) a centralized database system of the college was developed.
- b. Under the ERP, messages on the parents' mobiles were sent regarding the attendance of their ward, parent teacher meetings and reminders for the last date of submitting college fees.
- c. Admissions were conducted online through online forms.
- d. Bio-Metric system of attendance for staff and students was started.
- e. Bar coding of library books was completed.

### V. Major Obstacles

- The major obstacle is the Cantonment Board as the College is situated on the cantonment land and the infrastructure cannot be expanded as the permission is usually denied.
- Anything new that is endeavoured to be done does face numerous challenges and we learn and grow through experience. The college added many feathers to its cap by organising a UGC sponsored National Seminar and Workshop.
- The last minute refusals of the Resource Persons and Paper Presenters created a lot of last minute bassles
- It becomes difficult to keep the students interested for a long duration of time.
- Due to financial constraints it becomes difficult to get good Resource Persons from outside the state.
- It is sometimes difficult to arouse the interest of the faculty in the various Faculty Development Programmes conducted by the college.
- Due to technical glitches, the bio metric machines did not accept the finger prints of a large number of students.
- Swapping of classes specially when one teacher has completed the syllabi or is on leave and the other needs to take the class becomes difficult due to the pre feeding of the class time tables in the bio metric system.
- Under the ERP, sometimes the messages failed to reach the right destination due to change of mobile number.
- Since, admission forms were made online for the first time, parents and students who were not so technologically updated found it difficult to adapt to this change.

### VI. Outcome

The response of the parents in the Panel Discussion on Autonomy was overwhelming and many of them spoke openly in favour of Autonomy and even wished that the college would be a Deemed University one day. The students were apprehensive about the UGC sponsored National Seminar initially maybe due to financial constraints, but when exposed to the Seminar, they responded favourably which was reflected in their enthusiastic participation in the next UGC sponsored National Workshop. At the end of the session, the feedback that the students' gave was encouraging for the Organising Committees of the Seminar and Workshop. The students felt that such efforts should be made more often by the college. The students were exposed to a Research oriented method of study and they too tried to present papers during the seminar and the workshop.

The ERP connected the parents directly to the college on a daily basis, where they would receive an instant message if their ward had missed a class. That made the parents as well as the students more alert about regularity in class. Resultantly, the number of defaulters went down considerably.

Ralph Herring said, "Prayer is a summit meeting in the very throne room of the universe" and so we begin and end every important meeting with a prayer to the heavenly Control Room. The year began with a Prayer Service and staff meeting on the first of July 2013. Over the next few days there was an orientation programme for the Freshers' through power point presentation, Quiz, Screening of 'Khwab Dar Khwab' which documents the history of the college, a Talent Hunt to gauge their talents. In the meantime, regular classes started on the 8<sup>th</sup> July after time tables were finalized and Subject Orientation completed. This year we have implemented a very ambitious project-every class room is now fitted with a bio-metric system to record the attendance of the students. I would like to put on

record that our admissions are now online. Parents are alerted about the shortage of attendance of their daughters and invited to attend the Parent Teacher meetings via SMS.

Nels Ferre has written, 'the educator becomes God's mind at work to help grow the best possible plants in God's garden. He exists to prepare the soil, to sow the seed, to weed, to water and to harvest.' In Sophia teachers are educators, friends, facilitators, mentors, guides, experts, counselors and role models in charge of a spectrum of activities.

Freshers' Day was celebrated on the  $27^{th}$  of July and the month of August was filled with frenzied activity. A 5 day Dramatic Workshop culminated with an extempore competition after the Flag Hoisting on Independence Day on the Theme 'Bullet Vs Ballot'. Nominations for representatives to the Sophia Students Association took place on the  $21^{st}$  of August. The Results were announced on the  $23^{rd}$  and the student representatives were solemnly sworn in on the  $24^{th}$  of August.

During the Re-accreditation by NAAC, the Peer Team recommended that the College had the potential to work for autonomous status. The IQAC team worked round the clock to finalize their Report and a Panel Discussion was held on 'Autonomy is necessary for Academic Excellence.' This was an eye-opener as the students and teachers deliberated on the pros and cons. Another Panel Discussion was held for the Parents to inform them about this major step and to take a feedback from them.

After so much of serious work it was time to relax and we had programmes to honour our teachers on the 5<sup>th</sup> Sept and then the Sisters were sincerely appreciated for all their endeavors on the day set apart for them -- the 13<sup>th</sup> of September. Once again it was back to work as there was a lot of planning to be done for the Inter Collegiate Women's Tournament and the National Seminar in English and Home Sc. Sponsored by the U.G.C.

Heywood Brown has written 'Sports do not build character. They reveal it.' This was proved true during the 27<sup>th</sup> Inter Collegiate Woman's Tournaments from the 24<sup>th</sup> to the 26<sup>th</sup> Sept. 2014. Twenty four colleges participated in Basketball, Volleyball, Hockey and Cricket and our College won the Basketball Trophy for the 7<sup>th</sup> consecutive year. The girls added the Volleyball and Hockey Trophy to their Kitty and crowned their achievement by winning the General Championship. In October our students won the Trophy for Table Tennis and Handball. 7 students participated in the Inter-Varsity Tournament at Pattan in Gujarat and achieved the 2<sup>nd</sup> position. They qualified for the All India Tournament at Vijaywada (AP). Sophia has also been a Sports Authority of India Centre for the past 3 years and 15 girls have been receiving special coaching in the current session. 8 students participated in the Senior State Basketball Championship at Udaipur and secured the Runners up Position. Besides this the College organised Intramural Tournaments in Basketball, Volleyball, Badminton, Table Tennis. To keep the girls physically fit and toned the College has a gym with all the latest equipment donated by an ex-student. Here I would like to mention that 121 students completed a 14 hour certificate course in Yoga.

The acme of this academic year was definitely the National Seminar in English and Home Science. The English Seminar o 'Sensitisation towards Values through Literature' was held on the 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> October. It was a stupendous success. There were 61 delegates, 203 students and a total of 57 papers were presented. Prof. K.K. Sharma the vice-Chancellor of MDS University inaugurated the seminar and the eminent poet, Shri Keki Daruwalla held the audience enthralled with his erudite Keynote address. Shri Sunny Sebastian, the Vice-Chancellor of Haridev Joshi University of Journalism, Jaipur was the Chief Guest at the Valedictory function. The curtain came down with a spectacular performance of the musical 'Sister Act' by the members of Spectrum. The live choir was given a standing ovation, and as word went around the town about this musical extravaganza we held a repeat performance on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of October.

The second National UGC sponsored Seminar was organized by the Department of Home Science on the 22<sup>nd</sup> and 23<sup>rd</sup> of Nov. 2013. The Theme of the Seminar was 'Empowerment of women in the changing scenario.' 10 Resource Persons, 67 delegates and 213 students participated. At this function I would like to emphasize that at both the Seminars most of the Resource persons were our well-placed, highly successful alumni. At the Home Science Seminar a majority of our teachers presented Power Point presentations. The Keynote Address was delivered by Sr. Jessie Kurrian, eminent Supreme Court advocate and women activist. Mrs. Ellora Bagchi, a distinguished ex student and one of the first lady RAS officers was the Chief Guest at the Valedictory Function. The grand finale was the Annual Hindi Play 'Ye Dil Maange More' enacted by the members of Spectrum, the Dramatic Club.

The year gone by has been an academically stimulating period. Besides the above Seminars we have had Panel Discussions, Debates and Guest Lectures on topics ranging from 'the Food Security Bill is the need of the hour' to

'Election Issues', to a motivational drive by the District Authorities to enthuse students to exercise their right to vote, to a seminar conducted by a financial expert from the Bombay Stock Exchange.

The NSS Units of our college work sincerely for social awareness and equity. They organized essay competitions on the 'Future of our Nation' and 'Freedom and Equality.' They also had a Sports Day for the under privileged children of the neighboring Indira Colony and celebrated NSS Day on the 30th Sept. with zeal and enthusiasm. It is worth mentioning that they helped the same children to put up a cultural programme by training them in action songs, dance and street plays. On the 1st of October, 60 NSS volunteers donated blood for thallasemia patients at the JLN hospital. The volunteers are very sensitive towards nature and planted 100 saplings on the college campus. They also organized a lecture on 'Energy Conservation' and 'Life threatening diseases caused by a sedentary life style'. As 2013 saw the State Election, the volunteers staged a Nukkad Natak in Bandia Village to encourage the villagers to cast their vote to select the right representatives. A special 6 day camp was organized from the 25th to the 30<sup>th</sup> Nov. in which 100 volunteers participated whole heartedly. During this camp there were talks on Road Safety, First Aid, Nukkad Nataks, in the adopted village Bhoona Bhai on Election, Pollution, Conservation of Water and Energy, Gender, Injustice, Female education etc. The girls learned how to make Jewellery and then passed on their skills to the village women. Along with the Women Development Cell they had lectures on the RTI Act and a workshop in which about 300 girls learned Self-Defense Skills. The volunteers also took out a Rally to the Collectorate on World AIDS Day and performed a Nukkad Natak at the cross road to generate awareness about this modern scourge.

The college NCC unit has registered 42 cadets. Aishwarya Tehriya of B.Sc. Part II has brought glory to our institution by being selected for the one month 'Youth Exchange Programme' at Singapore. She also attended the prestigious OTA Chennai Camp. Rubal Dixit of B.A Part III and Charul Singh of BA Part I have added further luster by being selected for the Republic Day Camp at New Delhi. 26 cadets attended the All India Trekking Camp at Ajmer from the 17<sup>th</sup> to 25<sup>th</sup> Oct. 2013.

The greatest challenge of the day is how to bring about a revolution of the heart a revolution which has to start with each of us.' Dorothy Day states emphatically that a change of heart is essential to make the world a harmonious place. The Good News Group does just this with Jesus Christ as their Guru. A group of 60 girls accompanied me to Kerala to attend the 8<sup>th</sup> International Youth conference. Power 2013 Kerala from the 15<sup>th</sup> July. The Bishop of Ajmer Rt. Rev. Pius Thomas D'Souza offered the Holy Mass to call down the blessing of the Heavenly Father on the College and intercede for the inspiration of the Holy Spirit in the lives of the students. The Group regularly organises soul-stirring assemblies on all the important days in the college. They also had a Singing Competition and a Bible Quiz. 82 girls visited Mother Teresa's home for the destitute in Jaipur, prayed for them, talked and listened to their tragic life stories and wrote a group case study on them. The group also conducted an Advent Prayer Session to prepare for the Nativity of Jesus and to pray for one another. At the Final Meeting girls exchanged gifts and were rewarded for their participation.

Spectrum is the very vibrant Dramatic Club of the College. It provides the students a platform to channelize their theatrical skills; be it on the stage, in the wings or back stage. The annual English and Hindi play were directed by Merlyn Amaral and Prachi Ajwani of BA Hons (English) Part III. Besides these two full length productions, they staged plays on Freshers' Day, Independence Day, Teachers' Day, Management Day and Human Rights Day and even staged hard hitting Nukkad Nataks an socio-political issues.

My report may seem long but we do so much that I can only encapsulate life in Sophia in the words of the actor, Daniel Day Lewis "I live in a landscape, which every single day of my life is enriching". We have made it mandatory for every student to complete three Certificate Courses per year. Therefore, by the time a student walks out of the portals of this institution she is armed with 9 additional courses which give her cutting edge in this extremely competitive world. Besides this we continue to stress on Values for as the late freedom fighter Nelson Mandela said" A good head and a good heart are a formidable combination". Values are re-enforced every day at the Assemblies which are theme based. Each class conducts the assembly choosing a hymn, a scripture reading, a motivational anecdote, a thought for the day and of course the NEWS. As the Principal, I take sessions with the Final year students and Sr. Pearl assisted by trained medical personnel prepare the girls for their future roles in creating a happy and healthy ethos in their own little families.

We live in a world of Information Technology and as it empowers people, makes them productive and innovative; the Department of Computers decided to christen their IT week 'RED HAT' after the American Software Multinational. They organised Power Point Presentations on future Gadgets, Security, Operating Systems and Robotics. There was a Collage making competition on 'The Role of women in the IT sector'. An Extempore Competition in which every group members had to speak on a topic. A technical session evaluated the skills of a

group in creating a Web Page in half an hour: A quiz tested the knowledge of the students, the Ad-Mad Competition demonstrated their creative skills and on the Final Day the students displayed their working models on Security Alarm, Metro, Energy Conservation etc. The Economic Planning Forum has had an intellectually fruitful year. The members debated on the food security bill. 80 students attended a lecture by Prof. Motilal Mahamallik, IDS, Jaipur on Statistical Package for Social Sciences (SPSS). Four students of Economics Hons. The thrust on research was further enhanced when' Prakriti' the Geography Forum, published a research Journal with 21 papers covering a plethora of activities of regional, national and global relevance. This is a small but very important step in our journey towards creating a research oriented environment in the college. The Forum also held chart making and Power Point Presentations and screened the movie '2012'.

This year the Sophian Psychological Association endeavored to help students to find career options in their subject by exposing them to organizations working in the field. The students visited UMANG the school for children with special needs. They were sensitized to the needs of the marginalized and now have many career options in front of them. The students also, conducted various tests like SWOT Analysis, Johari window, and a test on Emotional Intelligence, Depression and self Efficacy among Teenagers.

Galaxy, the Science Forum attempted to develop a scientific temper among its members by holding a Quiz, a Skit, a Jam Session and a Fancy Dress Competition on Myths, Facts, Science and Ethics. The Mathematics Forum had power point presentations and research papers on cut-copy paste, Media, Pollution in Ana Sagar Lake, Machinery and its impact on human labour. The members exhibited vivid sketches of famous Physicists and Mathematicians. The students also visited Tilonia to study the world famous Solar Energy Project undertaken there.

The Management Forum also organised various competitions for the holistic development of the students. The Seminar on 'Investor Security' conducted by Mr. Bakul Pandya sponsored by Bombay Stock Exchange and the Institute of Company Secretaries was a truly enlightening experience. The students gained practical knowledge and were exposed to the execution of managerial functions on their industrial visits to the Parle-G Factory and Saras Dairy, Ajmer. The Commerce Forum based most of their activities on Banking and Marketing. They had a seminar on 'Understanding capital markets in India'. The students created posters on the devaluation of the Rupee and Models on "The Development of Banks". The Department organised an Exhibition Cum Sale of Handicrafts and Food.

Lyceum, the Forum for Pol. Science, Sociology and History organised a written Quiz and screened the movie' Water' in an attempt to make the girls think about the plight of widows. They also organised a Slogan Competition on 'Corruption' and an Essay writing Competition on Responsible Leadership and Nation Building.

The High-water mark of the Literary Forum was the National Seminar in English. At this Seminar the girls also expressed their Views on a Graffiti Wall and penned their Values on the Value Tree. In the Annual English Debate, 24 participants debated and analyzed the topic "Social Networking Sites are the modern drawing rooms of India". The forum also organised a seminar on "Literature down the ages." 82 students participated in the same and view 5 very impressive Power Point Presentations. 25 girls attended the recently concluded Jaipur Literary Festival and were mesmerized by the scholarly discussions. The topic of the Annual Hindi Debate was

31 girls registered for ICCC, the MDS University Cultural Festival our college stud first in seven segments and secured the second position in two competitions. As in the past, Republic Day will be celebrated tomorrow with all patriotic fervor. The Farewell Function on Monday will bring to a close the cultural activities and the next day we begin with the University practical examinations.

  - o Their expectation from the college
  - o The role of the college in the development of their personality
  - Students were asked to evaluate on the scale of 10
- The conclusions drawn were:
  - The courses are relevant in terms of knowledge, content and their applicability in real life situations.
  - The syllabus is supported with sufficient reference books and text books available in the library.
  - The knowledge of the latest technological techniques related to IT helped them to make use of the knowledge available on the internet. This way they could keep up with the latest trends in their fields.
  - Curricular and Co-curricular activities like Power Point Presentations, Seminars, Exhibitions, Surveys, Field Trips and Projects helped in clear and better understanding of the subject.
  - The syllabus offered by the University was inadequate and not at par with the syllabi of various competitive exams and needed upgradation.
